# SPAN 309 — Business Spanish of International Trade in the Hispanic World

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## Description

**This course** focuses on the commercialization of goods and services from and to the Hispanic world.

Students learn the terminology of international business and learn to discuss issues such as freetrade agreements.

Students engage with real-world materials, documentation, and speak to professionals who work in foreign trade in Spanish.

The course integrates competencies that employers expect in new graduates (e.g., problem-solving).

#### **Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, students are able to:

- •Remember technical terms for international trade.
- •Recognize the names of emerging Latin American markets and their main products and services for export.
- •Explain the documents used for trading goods and services from and to Latin America.
- •Identify the steps involved in the commercialization of an agricultural commodity (e.g. soy, wheat, fruits) from a Latin American producer up to a Canadian supermarket.
- •Demonstrate knowledge of the regulations of free trade agreements and the current state of affairs between Canada and Latin American countries.
- •Assess job market opportunities in international commerce where new UBC graduates could work.
- •Analyze critically main ideas from case studies reviewed in class that involve import-export companies.
- •Design a final term project that includes all major steps for importing a product or services from an emerging Latino market to Canada.

# **Thematic Units**

#### Thematic units

During the course, students study eight thematic unites. Students read authentic sources and analyze each theme critically.

Theme 2(a) North American Free Trade Agreement

Theme 2(b) Asian-Pacific Economic Cooperation

Theme 3 The international banking system

Theme 4(a) Imports

Theme 4(b) Exports

Theme 5(a) Free trade agreements under scrutiny

Theme 6 Transporting goods and services

Theme 7 Protectionism

Theme 8 For and against international trade

# Flexible Learning Structure


The course integrates an online component and inclass teaching, practice, and discussion.

Students work with structured input (i.e., premodified) that highlights particular features of grammar and terminology (VanPatten, 1995).

Practice exercises present a single concept at a time, keep meaning in focus, and require application of information if input processing is successful.

Case studies present challenging situations. Students work in groups (*Teamwork*) to analyze and propose strategies to solve them (*Analysis and Problem-Solving*).
