Goals

- Health professional students need comprehensive lactation education practice
- Confidence to counsel families
- Educational approaches to represent:
 - body neutrality
 - normalize breast/ chestfeeding
 - diverse BIPOC/LGBTQIA+
- Format: Deliberate narrative, case studies and visual approaches

Methods

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

1. Demonstrate hand expression and cup feeding as alternative feeding methods to support exclusive breastfeeding.
2. Implement initiation of breastfeeding within the first hour including at risk populations to decrease morbidity and mortality.
3. Provide anticipatory guidance regarding normal newborn feeding, sleeping and output behavior in the first 3 days.
4. Understand the importance of discharge planning and postpartum support to prevent early weaning.
